Mainstream 20th-century democratic theory emerged in the shadow of the collapse of Weimar Germany, a country thought to have a participatory culture,⁵and during an era of extreme pessimism about democracy’s future, as totalitarianism based on mass mobilization threatened democracies from left and right.

The Impact of Participatory Democracy

Participatory democracy, under some of these modalities, enshrines a new political role to the ordinary citizen, whereby the citizen becomes required to pronounce himself, and is supposed to be able to position himself politically when the share of initiative left to participants is reduced to a minimum.

The Moment for Participatory Democracy

In the North, the first stirring of participatory democracy showed in the movements created in the late 60s and 70s - particularly the women's, students' and radical trade union movement - in response to the feeble, ineffective nature of electoral democracy. These radical social movements were the product of a very specific historical experience.

Why Participatory Democracy Matters - And Movements Matter ...

In the 1960s defenders of a participatory conception of democracy, which had a politically active citizenry at its center, took up the cudgels against proponents of a “realistic” democratic theory. The latter argued that, in light of findings from the (then new) empirical surveys showing that most individuals were politically inactive and lacked interest in or knowledge of politics, ideas about citizens’ participation should be revised accordingly.
